The Auto Check-In is unprompted; it is not the same as teaching "look". Unprompted behaviors are more easily repeated, and will become a natural part of interaction.

It is never too late to have this natural eye contact become a meaningful communication tool in your relationship. The more ACI's can be captured and rewarded, the more pup will offer.

This is a two-party game; both human and canine must participate for the Auto Check-In to be successful.

Pups seek reciprocal communication before they even open their eyes. In those early stages, touch and warmth indicate proximity to their mother or littermates. When pups go home they seek the same kind of interaction. After a while, humans may sometimes fail to acknowledge the nonverbal communication pups seek. If that attention continues to be acknowledged, it will result in a very strong foundation. The natural decisions pups make seldom coincide with our preferences. It is much easier to direct the behavior of a pup who finds checking in with us rewarding.


Welcoming a rescue into your home may seem different in the beginning, but they will seek information about how their new world is organized. Starting a relationship with the ACI will build the same strong foundation.

Keep in mind that the ACI is about connection. Teaching "look" is not the same. "Look" can be a good starting point for dogs not accustomed to giving eye contact, but the true power of the ACI is in the pup deferring to the handler for information.

Benefits of the Auto Check In

Relationship Information - The ACI acknowledges the handler as the leader and decision maker in the relationship. Leaders pay attention and make appropriate decisions for the safety and well-being of others. The ACI may indicate pup is looking to the decision maker for direction. Your response guides the outcome.

Situational Information - Pups who offer the ACI may be letting the handler know that they are feeling uncomfortable about something in the environment, such as an approaching dog, a bicycle, construction work, new surroundings, loud traffic, etc. The handler should be able to acknowledge the information and make adjustments, such as providing a wider berth when passing a construction site. This kind of adjustment solidifies the role as a trustworthy leader.



Relationship Strengthening - When pup offers an ACI and the handler responds, they are strengthening the communication bond between the them.

Owner Awareness - The ACI encourages the leader to pay attention to pup and the environment. If the handler is otherwise engaged and misses that valuable interaction, they risk losing pup's trust.

Freedom - Because the ACI provides such a strong basis for a reliable recall (coming when called), pup may enjoy much more freedom.
