Hide 10 treats in an area, together find five and then run to the next space where you've hidden a special toy to play with briefly before resuming the hunt!




Then run to the next room where you've smeared a tiny bit of peanut butter on the inside or outside of the tub or cabinet door. Look there's a towel with treats hidden in it!



Tomorrow the towel won't be there, but a box may be with packing peanuts and mini marshmallows (Yes! A few won't hurt, and they're something different).

Other Ideas: Smear surfaces like a tub, dishwasher, refrigerator, or some cabinets with peanut butter, soft cheese or baby food. Use elevation as an element of surprise. Instead of treats, hide a treat dispensing toy or a Kong they can play with. Create a maze in a larger room with boots, pans, boxes, luggage, chairs or anything else you may have handy.
